2024 **FIRST QUARTER** REPORT

Maricopa County Recorder's Office



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Recording Services Department

Since 1871, the Maricopa County Recorder's Office has been responsible for recording and maintaining public records for Maricopa County. Historically, the majority of recorded documents have been real estate-related documents such as deeds, liens, and plat maps. Customers can record documents digitally through an online account, by mail, in person at our downtown Phoenix location, and at our expanding customer kiosks throughout the county! Between January 1, 2024 and March 31, 2024, the Office recorded 166,042 documents – a nominal decrease from the 166,712 documents recorded in the first quarter of 2023.¹ Of those documents, 90.57 percent were recorded digitally, which represents a 1.2 percent increase from the 89.37 percent that were recorded digitally in the same quarter last year.

Maricopa Title Alert

<u>Maricopa Title Alert</u> is a program launched by the Recorder's Office on June 1, 2023. It is a free service offered to keep residents informed and take a proactive step against title fraud and the recordation of unlawful documents.² In the first quarter, the program was enhanced with the addition of a significant convenience feature: users can now receive alerts via text. As of March 31, more than 60,000 individuals activated accounts monitoring over 125,000 names. Signing up is easy. It takes only two minutes, and it is available in both English and Spanish. Document Fees

Documents (except for plats and surveys) are recorded for a flat fee of \$30, regardless of document length. You can view all recording fees <u>here</u>.

Conferences and Speaking Events

During the first quarter of 2024, the Recording Services Department actively participated in numerous interviews, speaking engagements, and conferences. We provided valuable information and took time to address customers' inquiries. A highlight was the department's focus on promoting Maricopa Title Alert, an initiative implemented by the department to help prevent and address title fraud. Notable engagements included:

- Banner Olive Branch Senior Center | January 31, 2024: Spoke about Maricopa Title Alert and assisted attendees in signing up on their computers.
- Kiwanis Club | February 1, 2024: Discussion centered around Maricopa Title Alert and its benefits.
- Arizona Association of Independent Paralegals (AAIP) | February 3, 2024: Focused on the importance of the Maricopa Title Alert for paralegals in assisting their clients.

• Property Records Industry Association (PRIA) Conference | May 5-7, 2024: Addressed redaction practices in Arizona pursuant to state statute, emphasizing our commitment to privacy and security.

These events are just a few examples of how our Office proactively engages with the public and professionals to highlight legal requirements, standards, and practices of the Recorder's Office. Through these efforts, we aim to educate our customers on the importance of proper recordation of public documents, ensuring transparency, security, and accessibility for all.

In addition to entering documents into the public record, the Recorder's Office indexes documents by name and document type to allow them to be <u>searchable</u> on the Recorder's Office website. There are currently over 52 million searchable documents dating back to 1871. The team indexes 2,500 documents a day on average, with an approximately 72-hour turnaround time for those documents to be searchable by name on the Recorder's Office website.

The Recording Services Department has made significant progress in its extensive re-indexing project, aimed at re-indexing over 4 million documents. As of March 31, the department successfully re-indexed approximately 2.5 million documents. This leaves 1.5 million documents pending re-indexation. Despite original projections of four years, the project's timeline dramatically reduced to fewer than 18 months, as a result of hardworking staff and innovative practices.

Looking Forward: Strategic Goals for the Coming Quarters

Going into Q2 and the rest of the year, the department is looking to achieve several key goals and objectives. One priority is to launch all five kiosks across strategic locations to improve accessibility and user engagement with recording services. Concurrently, we will begin testing of the new website to ensure it meets our standards for user experience and functionality, aiming for a seamless transition for all customers. Building on the improvements made this quarter with the addition of text alert functionality to the Maricopa Title Alert (MTA) program, the Office's objective is to further increase participation. Our goal is to ensure more residents are informed and alerted about potential title fraud and the recording of unlawful documents.

Voter Registration Department

The Maricopa County Recorder's Office is responsible for voter registration and maintenance of the county's voter rolls. Maricopa County has approximately 2.4 million active registered voters. This year-round work includes modifications to existing records, cancelations, corrections, and processing of new voter registration applications.

As in previous quarters, the Voter Registration Department continues to experience elevated demand due to population growth and ongoing developments in Maricopa County. This trend, combined with the March 12 Jurisdictional Election and the March 19 Presidential Preference Election (PPE), has significantly increased operational demands. From January to March, the department processed 39,440 new voter registration applications and over 100,000 updates to existing voter registration records.

Voters regularly update or modify their voter registration records, including party affiliation, addresses, and Active Early Voting List (AEVL) status. For example, between January 1 and March 31, we received 100,230 requests for updates related to names, addresses, or party affiliations.

Voter List Maintenance

The Voter Registration Department performs regular and continual maintenance to ensure the voter rolls remain current. The department leverages reports from various intergovernmental and authoritative third-party sources, including the Secretary of State's Office, the Arizona Department of Health and Vital Statistics, the Arizona/Federal courts, USPS National Change of Address, and the <u>Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC)</u>, to facilitate these maintenance activities. In accordance with <u>A.R.S § 16-165</u>, our ongoing list maintenance efforts led to 14,234 individuals being removed from the voter rolls during the first quarter of 2024. To further our objective of maintaining accurate voter rolls, this quarter saw the launch of a public advertising campaign that encouraged voters to check their registration status by visiting <u>BeBallotReady.Vote</u> and update their voter registration details if necessary. The campaign is funded by appropriations from the Arizona State Legislature and has allowed the Office to further reinforce our already robust and effective maintenance processes. Looking Forward: Strategic Goals for the Coming Quarters

As we advance into the next quarter and look towards the remainder of the year, the Voter Registration Department is diligently setting a series of strategic goals to ensure readiness for the forthcoming elections. Chiefly, the migration of all voter registration functions to the Elections and Recorder Operations (ERO), the Office's voter registration database platform, is underway, with enhancements specifically targeting the notice and petition modules for improved efficiency. Additionally, the team is receiving training to handle and certify candidate challenges accurately through signature verification.

The department will continue to work to maintain accurate and current voter registration rolls, utilizing confirmation mailings and 90-day notice cards. In response to new county branding and evolving legal mandates, we are redesigning Voter Registration Cards to meet the standards while embracing a fresh aesthetic.

We are actively hiring temporary Voter Registration staff to prepare for the 2024 election cycle and the processing of initiative and referendum petitions. This step is crucial for managing the increased workload and ensuring smooth operations. Additionally, in response to new legislation impacting voter registration processes, we are proactively updating our procedures to ensure full compliance, including assisting in making necessary changes to the state voter registration form.

Early Voting Department

Under Arizona state law, the administration of elections within Maricopa County is divided between the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors and the Maricopa County Recorder. The Board of Supervisors is responsible for overseeing Election Day operations and vote tabulation, while the Recorder is tasked with managing voter registration and early voting, including mail-in voting. The Maricopa County Board of Supervisors and Recorder's Office work in concert to administer jurisdictional elections within the County, such as city and town races, city bond measures, and school district override measures, as well as the once-every-four-years Presidential Preference Elections, and the biannual July Primary Election, and the November General Election.

In collaboration with the Board of Supervisors, our Office successfully administered several critical elections in the first quarter of 2024. On March 12, we oversaw jurisdictional elections for two distinct areas. Litchfield Park residents voted on ratifying their Final Charter, while voters in the City of Tempe elected their mayor and councilmembers and made decisions regarding the General Plan 2050. Additionally, on March 19, we conducted the Presidential Preference Election (PPE), which allowed registered Republicans and Democrats to select their preferred 2024 presidential nominee.

March 12 Jurisdictional Election

During the March 12 jurisdictional elections involving the City of Litchfield Park and the City of Tempe, we issued 89,724 ballots. For the Tempe election, we issued 85,029 ballots. Of these, 24,387 were returned and counted. In Litchfield Park, 4,695 ballots were issued, with 1,827 returned and counted. These were all-mail elections, so every eligible voter in Litchfield Park and Tempe received a ballot by mail, whether they were on the Active Early Voting List (AEVL) or not.

Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA) for the March 12 Jurisdictional Election

During the first quarter of 2024, January 1 – March 31, the UOCAVA team initiated the dispatch of ballots to registered UOCAVA voters for the 2024 March Jurisdictional election. Of approximately 89,724 combined ballots issued for the election, 179 were UOCAVA early ballots.

Special Election Boards (SEB) for the March 12 Jurisdictional Election

For this election, 22 ballots were issued that included special accommodations such as Braille and large print or were processed by a special election board upon request.


Signature Verification and Ballot Curing for the March 12 Jurisdictional Election

Ballot curing is a remedial process undertaken to resolve issues with ballots that cannot be signature verified. It comes into play when a voter's signature on their ballot affidavit envelope does not match the signatures we retain on file. This is done in accordance with <u>A.R.S. § 16-550</u>;

our team engages in a thorough outreach to voters to rectify any discrepancies. During the March 12 Jurisdictional Elections, we identified 396 ballots needing curing. We verified voters' identities through various methods—mail, email, text, or phone calls—and cured 301 ballots. <u>Click here</u> to understand more about how Maricopa County conducts signature verification and ballot curing.

March 19 Presidential Preference Election (PPE)

The Presidential Preference Election (PPE) on March 19 involved 1,528,856 eligible voters. Participation was restricted to registered Republicans and Democrats, pursuant to <u>A.R.S. § 16-</u> <u>241</u>, which designates this election for determining each party's preferred presidential nominee. The turnout was 609,826 voters, resulting in a participation rate of approximately 39.9%. Our Office worked diligently to communicate to voters that the PPE is distinct from the Primary Election, emphasizing that registered Party Not Designated (PND) and Independent voters will have the opportunity to participate in the upcoming July Primary Election. This effort aimed to clarify and ensure voters are informed about some of the legal nuances of the forthcoming elections.

Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA) for the March 19 PPE


During the first quarter of 2024, January 1 – March 31, the UOCAVA team managed the dispatch of ballots to registered UOCAVA voters for the 2024 PPE. Of the total ballots distributed, 3,615 were sent to UOCAVA voters, with 860 being received and counted.

Special Election Boards (SEB) for the March 19 PPE

For this election, the SEB team facilitated the voting process for voters requiring special accommodations. A total of 529 ballots were issued, which included options such as Braille, large print, or assistance from a special election board, with 394 of these ballots received and counted.


Comparative Analysis of Voter Turnout: 2024 vs. 2016 and 2020

The 2024 PPE experienced a lower voter turnout percentage compared to the elections of 2016 and 2020, indicating a decrease in participation among eligible voters.



Signature Verification and Ballot Curing for the March 19 PPE

Ballot curing is a remedial process undertaken to resolve issues with ballots that cannot be signature verified. It comes into play when a voter's signature on their ballot affidavit envelope does not match the signatures we retain on file. This is done in accordance with <u>A.R.S. § 16-550</u>; our team engages in a thorough outreach to voters to rectify any discrepancies. During the 2024 PPE, we identified 8,437 ballots in need of curing. We verified voters' identities through various methods—mail, email, text, or phone calls—and cured 6,126 ballots. <u>Click here</u> to understand more about how Maricopa County conducts signature verification and ballot curing.



Analysis of AEVL Participation and Voting Method Preferences

The adjacent graphs illustrate two key aspects of voter engagement during the Maricopa County Presidential Preference Election. The first graph shows the number of mail ballots sent in relation to the total number of eligible voters, indicating a high level of participation through the Active Early Voting List (AEVL). The second graph details the voting methods, revealing that most participants opted for early voting, with a smaller proportion voting in-person on Election Day.

Primary and General Election Preparation

In anticipation of the July 30 Primary Election and the November 5 General Election, the Recorder's Office and the Early Voting Department specifically undertook significant renovations and improvements in Q1 2024 to bolster election infrastructure:

- Recent renovations at the Maricopa County Tabulation and Election Center (MCTEC)
 have introduced two new portable structures built specifically to expand signature
 verification capabilities. This upgrade significantly expanded our signature verification
 capacity, allowing full-time assignment of up to 46 Signature Verification Temps to this
 crucial task throughout the election cycle. This marks a substantial increase from the 25
 workstations available in previous cycles, directly responding to the growing demands of
 the election process. This increased throughput will allow Maricopa County to process
 ballot packets more quickly while maintaining the integrity of the process.
- Another notable upgrade was the creation of a dedicated area within MCTEC, outfitted with verification terminals for 15 curing agents, a considerable enhancement from the previously available single curing station.

- The restructuring within MCTEC also facilitated the relocation of 20 hand count boards from the Big Room to the newly established L Room. This strategic move allows the 50 Early Ballot Processing Boards to maintain their operations in the Big Room without interruption and ensures ample space for the post-election hand count process.
- Beyond physical renovations, there have been extensive improvements in operational processes surrounding the mailroom, curing, signature verification, and flagging. These enhancements will improve communication both internally and with our external partners, including the United States Postal Service and Runbeck. The objective is to make processes more efficient and enhance the chain of custody documentation.

Signature Verification Improvements:

In preparation for the July 30 Primary Election and the November 5 General Election, the Early Voting Department is implementing a new Signature Verification training and certification program. This initiative features Level 1 (Entry Level) and Level 2 (Manager Level) courses, designed to replace the previous single, extensive three-day signature verification training for all staff. By dividing the training into two distinct modules, the department can better address different staff levels' specific needs and responsibilities. This initiative is set to launch in Q2. It aims to bolster the signature verification skills of our county team members, ensuring they are well-prepared for their roles in the upcoming elections.

In addition to the improvements in training, 18 new participants and 114 staff members have already undergone supplementary training. Furthering early voting election preparations, the Early Voting Department introduced a new role, Signature Verification Technician, which is responsible for overseeing internal system processes crucial for early voting. This role will ensure the efficient and timely flow of election data files between our third-party vendor, Runbeck, and our in-house early voting system.

Information Technology (IT) Department

The Information Technology (IT) Department provides technology solutions for the Maricopa County Recorder's Office and Elections. It is responsible for updating and managing the website for both the Recorder's Office and Elections. The department also handles informational security and cyber security for all office functions, including election tabulation, the voter registration database, and the recorded document database.

Geographic Information Systems (GIS)

A Geographic Information System (GIS) is a collection of spatial information that maps people, places, and things. The Maricopa County Recorder's Office and Elections use GIS for voter registration and election planning. When a voter registers or changes their registration, we search for the voter's address within the department's spatial address database. Once the address is found, we use spatial intersection functions to find a voter's district. This image is an example of these district layers.

While the Arizona Independent Redistricting

<u>Commission</u> (AIRC) is responsible for redrawing Congressional and Legislative district lines, Maricopa County is responsible for updating voting precincts, justice court precincts, and the Board of Supervisor district boundaries. During the first quarter, we developed new dashboards for Maricopa County Elections. The dashboards help to understand population densities so that vote centers can be positioned better around the County. Additionally, the dashboards help to track the status of temporary employees. We not only built legislative and district maps but also presented our Geographic Information



System (GIS) systems to various County departments. As a result of our expertise, specifically the GIS manager, we were invited to serve as advisors to the <u>Voting Information Project</u>. Furthermore, our GIS manager was interviewed for a book that is being written for the National Conference of State Legislatures.

March Jurisdiction and Presidential Preference Election

The IT team effectively managed the infrastructure and technology services for the March 2024 Jurisdictional Election and Presidential Preference Election (PPE). With 150 in-person voting centers, 27 days of early voting, and over a million eligible voters, these two elections served as crucial benchmarks for the upcoming 2024 Primary and General Elections.

IT Updates and Advancements

The IT Department engaged in various projects and initiatives throughout the first quarter. Alongside maintaining existing infrastructure, they've made significant progress on multiple fronts. These include:

Cyber Security Enhancements:

This quarter, the IT team welcomed new members, including an Information Security Officer (ISO) with a rich IT security background and a Cyber Security Analyst to prepare for the 2024 elections. Alongside a newly appointed Chief Information Security Officer, the team is focused on safeguarding against cyber and physical threats to election processes and collaborating closely with various law enforcement agencies.

Technology Infrastructure Updates:

The infrastructure team has been pivotal in maintaining and advancing the technology needed for smooth election operations. Noteworthy achievements include renovating the Maricopa County Tabulation and Election Center (MCTEC), setting up 1,400 voter check-in stations for the PPE, and deploying portable satellite-based internet access in remote areas. Additionally, the team upgraded systems like the Dominion Election Management System from version 5.5 to 5.17 and continue to monitor and update the infrastructure to enhance security and efficiency.

Technology Projects:

IT project managers are leading several critical initiatives, including deploying the "GoDeskless" support system for real-time tracking of field personnel and a new Warehouse Management System for streamlined setup and inventory management during elections. They are also supervising the installation of new public records and digital document management systems, incorporating AI enhancements.

Application Developments:

The Application Development team has launched a new Voter Registration system, Elections and Recorder Operations (ERO), replacing outdated infrastructure with modern technology. They are also developing modules for petitions, early voting, and board worker management, and they manage the recording of over 3,000 digital documents daily. Recent collaborations include working with the website team on a new SMS text alert system for the Maricopa Title Alert, which now supports over 60,000 users.

Website Development Progress:

Significant upgrades to the Elections web page were made in June 2022, the Recorder's Office web page is set to receive similar updates, utilizing a leading Content Management System to enhance ease of updates and cybersecurity.

Conferences and Speaking Events:

The IT Department actively participated in a multitude of local and national conferences, encompassing various topics ranging from election security to AI technologies. The department's participation in these conferences exemplifies its commitment to staying up to date with the latest technological advancements and their applications. Below is a list of some of the conferences attended by our IT Department in the first quarter:

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Democracy Forum – New York, NY

• Our IT team, along with journalists, AI researchers, professors, technologists, and election officials, came together in New York to discuss the potential advantages and challenges that AI technology brings to the election environment. CactusCon – Mesa, AZ

• The local cybersecurity and hacker conference in Mesa, AZ, just had its twelfth edition. This conference brings together cybersecurity professionals to discuss practical issues related to information technology. During the event, our IT participated in the *Arizona Elections Security Prep for 2024* panel and shared their insights.

Global Ties Arizona – Phoenix, AZ

• The IT team spoke with a select group of European leaders in their respective countries' election environments. This group discussed elections in Maricopa County and the United States. They also discussed threats to election processes and the issues and benefits of AI in specific election scenarios.

External Affairs Department

The External Affairs Department, which consists of the Communications and Constituent Services teams at the Recorder's Office, works in close collaboration to provide accurate, relevant, and timely information to the public. They achieve this by producing quarterly and annual reports, engaging with and assisting constituents daily, fulfilling public records requests, and managing the Deputy Registrar program. These teams ensure that constituents receive the highest level of service and support from the Maricopa County Recorder's Office.

Communications Outreach

• Interviews

Recorder Richer participated in over 36 interviews with local and national news outlets in the first quarter. The majority were with local news outlets, informing voters of essential and timely information regarding the March elections. Here are some of the highlights:

- In January, Recorder Richer joined FOX10's John Hook to talk about our voter list maintenance campaign and the 2024 elections.
- On February 20, Recorder Richer spoke with KTAR's Heidi Hommel to inform voters that Feb. 20 was the last day to register for the PPE.
- In March, the Recorder interviewed with various news outlets, including Associated Press, 12 News, FOX10, and ABC15, to discuss and answer questions about the March elections.

• Maricopa Tabulation and Election Center (MCTEC) Tours

 Our Office provides tours of the tabulation center, which is open to all constituents. These tours guide participants through the life of a ballot, from early voting to tabulation. We successfully hosted eight tours in the first quarter despite entering a lockdown period for the March Jurisdictional Election and the Presidential Preference Election (PPE). • Conferences and Speaking Events

Throughout the various departments, the Recorder's Office participated in over twenty local and national conferences covering a diverse range of topics, including, but not limited to, cyber security, document recording, and intergovernmental affairs. Recorder Stephen Richer participated in over a dozen speaking events, educating groups on election administration and providing information about upcoming elections.

Social Media:

This quarter, our Office increased the frequency of postings, follower counts, and post engagement, recognizing that these efforts are essential for delivering critical and timely

information to Maricopa County residents. Additionally, we began utilizing Instagram and YouTube again as regular posting platforms. Here are some of the highlights from our social media accounts:

Facebook:

- Our post reach has increased by 94.5% from the previous quarter.
- Engagement with our posts has risen by 72%.
- Posts that include date reminders and deadlines rank among our most popular organic content, achieving up to 385% greater reach than our average posts.
- The estimated audience size is between 238,000 and 281,000.



X/Twitter:

- We significantly enhanced our activity with 136 posts, more than double the number from the corresponding quarter of the previous year.
- Link clicks totaled approximately 1.1K, averaging 12 clicks per day.
- The most engaging post was the "<u>Sticker Contest Top 10 Finalists</u>," which received 1,664 engagements.

Voter List Maintenance Ad Campaign

This quarter, our Office collaborated with <u>Commit Agency</u> to develop an advertising campaign for voter list maintenance, funded by appropriations from the Arizona State Legislature. This has been a highly successful campaign, significantly enhancing our efforts to keep Maricopa County's voter rolls accurate and up to date. The ad campaign reached a wide audience and effectively communicated to voters the importance of checking and updating their registration at <u>BeBallotReady.Vote</u>. Campaign Reach and Impact:

- The highest-viewed ad on YouTube, the <u>20-second version</u>, yielded approximately 478,000 views.
- Traffic to <u>BeBallotReady.Vote</u> was up as much as 2,000% year-over-year.

I Voted Sticker Contest



This quarter, the Maricopa County Recorder's Office initiated its inaugural "I Voted" sticker contest, making Maricopa County the largest to host such an event. We organized two separate contests: one for youth and one for adults. The youth competition, open to individuals aged 17 and under, attracted 97 submissions, while the adult category, for ages 18 and older, received 42 submissions.

In total, over 4,300 people participated by voting for their favorite stickers.

Livestreams

Our Office also began hosting live Q&A sessions with the Recorder on social media platforms like Facebook and X/Twitter. These sessions have been particularly well-received on X, attracting a combined total of 11,800 views. STAR Call Center

The STAR Call Center (Supervisors, Treasurer, Assessor, and Recorder) handles all inbound calls to our Office. We maintain a close partnership with STAR, with dedicated staff coordinating with the call center to ensure information is up-to-date and accurate.

In Q1, the STAR Call Center served over 26,200 constituents, who received assistance on topics including how to locate recorded documents, voter registration, election locations, restoration of voting rights, and more. See the table below for a breakdown of call statistics.

In preparation for the 2024 Primary and General Election and the anticipated growth in the volume of calls, STAR is planning to add more than 70 temporary call center representatives to assist constituents with election-related calls.

Constituent Correspondence

In addition to calls transferred to the team from the Maricopa County STAR Call Center, constituents contact the Office through multiple email inboxes and social media channels. The Recorder's Office Constituent Services team handles these requests and escalates issues to the appropriate subject matter experts within the Recorder's Office and Elections. Responding to hundreds, and sometimes thousands, of emails each week, the team addresses a range of concerns, including voter registration requests, inquiries related to upcoming elections, questions about recording documents, and concerns related to election administration.


Public Records Requests

The Office values transparency and access to information. Members of the public can submit a public records request (PRR) to obtain additional information from our office, such as voter and election data. During the first quarter of 2024, the Office received 221 public records requests, compared to 150 in Q1 of 2023. A breakdown of these requests is available below.

A requestor can submit a non-commercial PRR <u>here</u>, or a commercial purpose PRR <u>here</u>. Additional information regarding public records requests is available on our website <u>here</u>.

The Public Records team is currently working with vendors to develop and implement a new software system and database to improve the management and distribution of public records. This initiative aims to enhance transparency and convenience for Maricopa County residents by creating a self-service portal for certain public records.

Deputy Registrar Program

The Recorder's Office Deputy Registrar Program trains and certifies volunteers to provide voter registration and election information in their communities. In addition to the introductory training and certification class, the program expanded its curriculum in 2021 to offer continuing education courses to these volunteers and has seen growing interest. The Maricopa County Recorder's Office, in partnership with Deputy Registrars (DRs), takes part in events across Maricopa County.

Deputy Registrar Program Recap for the First Quarter of 2024: January 1 – March 31:

- 9 new DRs were certified and added to this program.
- ✤ As of March 31, 2024, there were 1051 certified DRs.
- ✤ 3 introductory classes were offered.
- 3 continuing education classes were offered, attended by 130 certified DRs covering the PPE.
- 18 staff members from Maricopa County's STAR Call Center received in-person training on the PPE.
- 231 students were registered to vote across three different high schools.
- 6 voter education and voter registration events were held that DRs volunteered to support. The DRs attended these events to help residents register to vote or update their voter registration.
- 767 new citizens were registered to vote at the voter registration events held following 26 Naturalization Ceremonies.

Deputy Registrar Program – Looking Forward to Future Quarters:

Junior Deputy Registrar Program

We announced the official launch of the Junior Deputy Registrar Program (JDRP) in collaboration with the Center for the Future of Arizona (CFA), marked by our inaugural training session held at Chandler High School. The JDRP allows interested student participants from high schools throughout Maricopa County to become Junior Deputy Registrars. Student participants must be at least 16 years old. The JDRP aims to empower high school students to participate in authorized and approved civic activities and work with first-time registrants and first-time voters within their schools. By providing training, the Recorder's Office seeks to foster active engagement in county government and encourage democratic participation. Now, we're expanding our outreach to more high schools across Maricopa County to grow the program further.

Corporate Program

The Constituent Services team has seen increased interest from corporations around topics of civic engagement, election laws, voter registration, and election administration. In the first quarter of 2024, our Office provided an in-person Deputy Registrar introductory class to <u>Native Health</u>. The Recorder's Office will continue to partner with corporations to provide voter registration and election information. Legislative Affairs

The 56th Arizona State Legislature

The 56th Legislature's second regular session, commonly known as the 2024 legislative year, commenced on January 8, 2024. As customary, laws passed and signed during this session will take effect 90 days after adjourning. See below for highlights of several bills from this session that hold significance for our Office:

1. <u>HB2785</u> and <u>SB1285</u>

- a. Commonly called the "Recount Timing Bills," these laws adjust the 2024 election calendar to ensure our 11 electoral votes are counted with the rest of the nations. Significantly, it moved the date of the 2024 Primary Election from August 6 to July 30.
- b. After the 2020 Presidential Election, the federal government enacted the <u>Electoral</u> <u>Count Reform and Presidential Transition Improvement Act of 2022</u>. This legislation updated the presidential transition of power and revised the electoral vote-counting process. One significant change was advancing the deadline for states to submit their list of officially elected presidential electors. This adjustment conflicted with Arizona's recount procedures, risking delays in the

final canvass and elector appointment. Arizona election administrators quickly collaborated with the state legislature to resolve this issue. As a result, Governor Hobbs signed new laws within six weeks to comply with federal deadlines. These laws, which include emergency clauses, took immediate effect for the entire calendar year of 2024.

2. <u>SB1342</u>

- a. This bill aims to improve the integrity and transparency of post-election hand count audits.
- b. This legislation has been signed into law and will become effective 90 days after the legislative session's conclusion.

3. <u>HB2482</u>

- a. This law allows voters to opt into a service that will notify them by text or email if their voter registration file is changed. Similar to <u>Maricopa Title Alert</u> and <u>BeBallotReady</u> ballot status notifications, constituents will be able to track any changes to their voter file.
- b. This legislation has been signed into law and will become effective 90 days after the legislative session's conclusion.

4. <u>SB1432</u>

- a. This bill allows property owners whose deed contains an unlawful and unenforceable restriction to record an amendment to the land records that effectively removes the restriction.
- b. This legislation has been signed into law and will become effective 90 days after the legislative session's conclusion.

The Recorder's Office remains committed to complying with all applicable and relevant laws and statutes governing our office.

Looking Forward: Strategic Goals for the Coming Quarters

The Maricopa County Recorder's Office's external affairs team is dedicated to equipping constituents, community partners, and media with information and resources related to document recordation, voter registration, and mail voting. From creating content to better educate the community to fostering partnerships with a wide range of organizations, working with lawmakers and fellow government agencies, and much more, the external affairs team will continue to take a creative and public-spirited approach to better connecting with Maricopa County residents and voters.

Throughout the remainder of the busy election year, Recorder Stephen Richer and the external affairs team will continue to focus on producing and promoting educational content. This includes filming short videos with Recorder Richer, regularly posting on multiple social media platforms, facilitating informative ad campaigns, sending the latest news via press releases and newsletters to roughly 30,000 people, and participating in interviews with members of the media.

The team is also focused on community engagement to better connect with constituents, which will continue to be a top priority throughout 2024. The external affairs team regularly hosts tours at the Maricopa County Tabulation and Election Center (MCTEC), where Recorder Richer shows visitors the life of the ballot and answers questions about election administration. Along with hosting these tours, the Recorder will continue to speak at events and meetings throughout the County, host live Q+A sessions, and promote participation in the growing Deputy Registrar program.

Additionally, the external affairs team continues to build partnerships with lawmakers and public agencies at the local, state, and federal levels. This allows Recorder Richer and the entire team to share best practices, analyze and discuss policies, and explore new opportunities to provide constituents with excellent service.




